

Here's what our students told us about the winter term

Home Situation

- 75-80% of students had a stable housing situation after the pandemic began
- Access to computers, Internet, software and online resources ranged from 75% - 92% good or very good
- Access to a quiet place to learn/study was difficult for ~50%

Experience with Remote Learning

- Undergrads: 73% accessed flexible vs 60% for fixed but Grads were 51% for flexible and 81% for fixed
- ~70% of both had difficulties with focus as well as personal stresses
- ~50% were unclear about the revised expectations for assessment

Requested help with

- Motivation, study and time management skills, and preparing for take-home exams

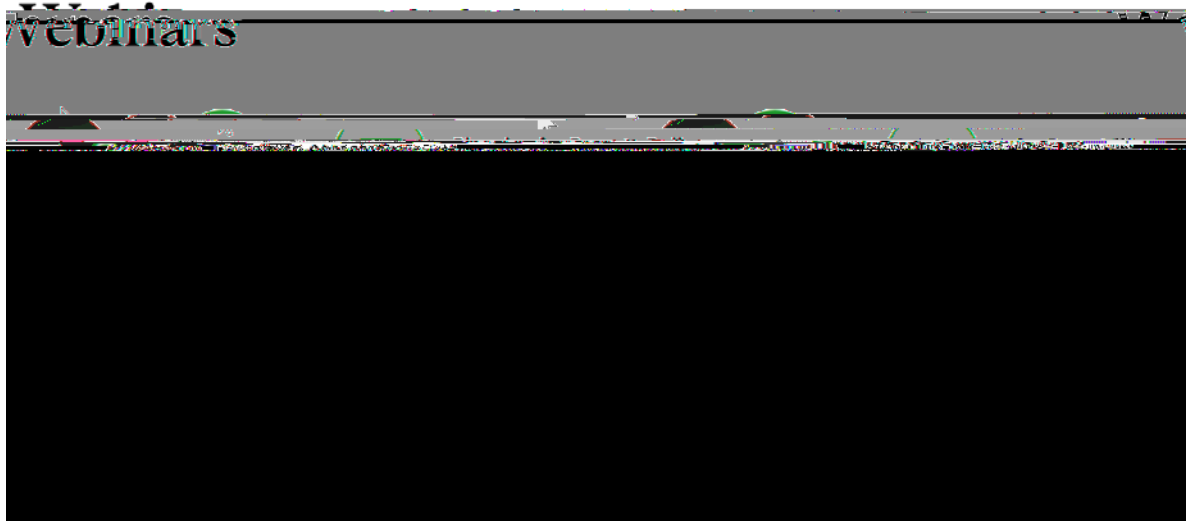
