When you get home with your prescription drugs

When you get home with your prescription drugs, you should check them carefully. Make sure you have the right number of pills or capsules. If you don't, call your pharmacist. You should also check the expiration date. If it's past the expiration date, you should not take the drug. You should also check the appearance of the drug. If it looks different from what you expect, you should not take it. You should also check the name of the drug. If it's not the same as what you were prescribed, you should not take it. You should also check the instructions. If they are different from what you were told, you should not take the drug. You should also check the packaging. If it's damaged, you should not take the drug. You should also check the storage conditions. If they are not what you were told, you should not take the drug. You should also check the return policy. If you have any questions, call your pharmacist.
