Comparative-historical sociology is an enormously rich research tradition and includes the works of such renowned sociologists as Theda Skocpol, Max Weber, and Charles Tilly, to name just a few. Scholars following this research tradition generally ask big questions and analyze large structures and long processes. What caused the emergence of effective states in Western Europe? Why did the West industrialize before other regions of the world? What causes social revolutions? How did colonialism affect postcolonial development?
