3.9 Quebec Inter-University Transfer Agreement: McGill Students

The Quebec Intell/niversityTransfer (IUT) agreement permits concurrequistration at McGill and another Quebec institution.

If you are a regular McGill undegraduate or graduategitee, diploma, or certi cate student, you magister, with your faculty's permission, at properties university for three, or in some cases sizedits per term in addition to your gistration at McGill. You may also obtain permission to complete a full term (i.e., 12 to 15 credits) at another Quebec emistry. These courses, subject too fully regulations, will be recognized by McGill for the given that you are registered for up to the limit imposed by the reside mequirements of the program. Normally on must complete a minimum reside mequirement of 60 credits at McGill in order to qualify for a McGill gieee (you should check with your dulty). This privilege will be granted if there are alid academic reasons.

3.11 Courses Taken under the Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory (S/U) Option

The principle of the Satisactory/Unsatisactory (S/U) option is to encourage you to atakourses outside the area of your specialization with the offie enabling you to acquire knowledge and skills in askiety of elds.

Where permitted by acculty and program gelations, you may takone elective course per term to be graded under the Statistic/Unsatistictory (S/U) option, to a maximum of 10% of your credits taket McGill to full the degree requirements.

If you decide to have an electie course graded as Satistfory/Unsatistactory (S/U), you must do so before the Course Change deadline on Minerv (www.mcgill.ca/minerv) as part of the Student Menu > Rustration Menu > Quite Add or Drop Course Sections Menitrou cannot make any changes after the Course Change deadline wen if you selected the option by mistate. If the course is a multi-term course, you must select the S/U option by the Course Change deadline of the rst part of the course.
